

Child, 8, falls to death in Yellowstone canyon

YELLOWSTONE NATIONAL PARK, Wyo. — An 8-year-old girl has died after falling about 550 feet while hiking in Yellowstone National Park. The National Park Service says the accident occurred Sunday morning in the Grand

Canyon of the Yellowstone. It identified the victim as Zahra Allahyari (ZEHR'-ah AHL-lah-yahr-ee) of Poway, California. According to the Park Service, the girl and members of her family were hiking down a trail on the north side of

the canyon to the Brink of the Lower Falls overlook. The agency says the child apparently stepped off the trail and lost her footing. Her body was retrieved around noon Sunday. The incident remains under investigation.

 by boosting students' problem solving skills and teaching them to think critically. At Watsonville High School, the nearly 2,000 enrolled students will soon each be issued their personal Chromebook, a small laptop computer that can be incorporated into nearly every facet of their education. Students can now compose their papers using the computers, where the relative ease of writing with a keyboard makes

the endeavor much easier than hand-writing them, said WHS English teacher Randy Alaga, who began incorporating the Chromebooks into his lessons in December. "I got much higher production right at the outset," he said. Better still, students can upload their work onto a server to be graded by teachers anywhere there is an Internet connection, Alaga said. This eliminates the need for teachers to haul giant stacks of papers to and from home, and shows students that their work is being read. Because the students are part of a network, teachers not only can make notes and edits

in their papers, but they can also see the papers as the students type them, Alaga said. Weaving computer work into academics has the added benefit of helping bringing students who are less tech-savvy up to speed with their peers. The purchase of the devices, which run a little more than \$300, was funded almost entirely by a Quality Education Investment Act grant, a California Department of Education program that provided funds to low-performing schools. Principal Elaine Legoretta said she expects the Chromebooks to be given out to all the students by January.

 for conversation or take them to social outings. While the office is based in Aptos, the organization has clients throughout Santa Cruz County, and is currently expanding its services into Monterey County, according to Bullard. Not only do the clients live throughout the county, but Right at Home boasts a caregiver force

from across the area as well. Although not required, caregiver applicants are preferred to have a Certified Nursing Assistant or equivalent background. The part-time schedule allows for a flexibility in the number of hours a caregiver works. "One of the reasons this kind of work is attractive is that it's flexible," Bullard said. Bullard, with a background in health care management, said he has always worked directly with clients in fields where it is "very personal." Along with his wife

Kam, who is a registered nurse, starting a Right at Home franchise in the county seemed to be the perfect next step for their careers. "It's just a really natural fit in an area that's growing in need," he said. "It's meaningful." The Right at Home franchise, which began in Omaha, Neb. in 1995, now has more than 350 locations in the United States, including operations in Canada, the United Kingdom, Brazil, Ireland and China.  people to come out and drink margaritas and eat great tacos," Giammanco said. The micro-craft tequila companies come from all over the state, including some from Mexico. The festival provides an opportunity for guests to sample their wares when they otherwise may not have heard of them. "A lot of them you are not going to be able to find in any liquor store," Giammanco said. The festival features Santa Cruz area taco vendors along with other styles of food, craft beer, and vendor booths. While guests will be able to try tradi-

tional tacos, a number of twists will be available, such as a garlic fried chicken fingers taco. Music will be performed by Extra Large, SambaDá and Candelaria. But after the end of the day, the producers of the festival hope guests will have gained a knowledge and appreciation for tequila. "Our whole mission is to educate people and have people drink educated," Giammanco said. "There's such an art to it." The festival made its premiere in Oxnard last year, selling out with more than 4,000 people attending, according to Giammanco. The Taco & Tequila Music Festival is another event from the producers of the California Beer Festival. The fourth annual festival was held in Aptos

Village Park on Aug. 9-10. The Beer Festival, which this year expanded to two days, was a success, with 3,000 people attending each day, according to Giammanco. The "Tequila Experience" admission, which is \$30, includes six half-ounce samples of tequila, and guests must be 21 years of age or older to purchase. General admission without tequila sampling is \$10. Children 12 and under are free. Proceeds benefit the Gen Giammanco Foundation, a non-profit organization that provides financial support to student athletes to assist in their pursuit of both scholastic and athletic success in Santa Cruz County.
